"Strengthening Family Cohesion and Solidarity" Family Education Videos – Drug Addict Father Turning over a New Leaf HO Wai-keung

Opening line

HO Wai-keung : After I quit drugs

a lot of things became different

Peer pressure influenced drug addiction

HO Wai-keung : I grew up as a small child in a (public) housing estate

It was a resettlement area

Thanks to my peers

I often loitered in the streets

and took up with people in the same circle

When one of them used drugs

the rest would be easily tempted to do the same

My first heroin use was at about 12 years old

Ever since the first use

I became a repeat (drug) offender serving times in prison on and off

This went on for as long as 30 years

a cycle of spells of drug use, no drug use and prison time

Losing loved ones while in prison

HO Wai-keung : The greatest impact of drug addiction on me was

losing 30 years of time

I most vividly remember that

when I served my first sentence in an addiction treatment centre

my grandfather passed away

I applied for a leave of absence from the centre to bid him a final farewell

but was denied it

My parents weren't there for me from an early age

and I was raised by my grandparents

When my grandfather was in his final moments

I was unable to see him off

Even when my grandmother died

I was also in prison

Determined to quit drugs for family

HO Wai-keung : I became determined to quit drugs because of my wife and daughter

I was in an industrial accident when I fell in a construction site

I was conscious

but I couldn't move my limbs at all

The first thing that came to mind was my family

My daughter was still so young

and my wife wasn't an identity card holder yet (non-Hong Kong resident)

How were they going to live?

That was the time I really had to be firm in quitting drugs

No sooner had I been discharged

than I went to see Ms. Yeung from Methadone Counselling Service

She was the social worker responsible for my case

I told her that

I want to be done with heroin and asked if she could help me

Quitting drugs brought better family relationship

HO Wai-keung : My family relationship differed considerably before and after I quit drugs

My wife had never held a grudge against me

but only persuaded me persistently

After quitting drugs

I have entirely different personal qualities

I get along with my family more harmoniously

and I bring positive energy to my daughter's development

Unwavering support from wife

Lai-ping : If you ask me

(Mrs. HO) whether my husband ever broke my heart

of course he did

Seeing him (on drugs)

made me feel very disappointed at the beginning

I didn't until then realise the grave harm of drugs

and it was so difficult to quit

He loved me so very much that

it was his affection for me

giving me the reason not to leave him

or despise him

but simply give him the motivation

I felt that he would persevere

and succeed

That's what I've always thought

Daughter appreciated his honesty

HO Yuk-yee : When I was in primary school

(daughter) Dad opened up to me one day

about his past drug use

Back then, it was pretty amazing to me that he succeeded in quitting drugs

Dad also told me that

he was thrown in and out of prison for several times

I wouldn't take him as a terrible person

On the contrary

as long as he's done with the bad habit

he's an excellent example in my eyes

In contrast to what others think

that is, a father should be a towering figure

I believe

my dad is a walking encyclopedia

It is from him that

I can understand many things beyond my experience

and know more about what I should do

Concepts like being loving and kind

are things that I learnt from him

Words for Dad

HO Yuk-yee : It must've been hard for you

(daughter) for what I've seen you do for the family

Thank you

Expectation for daughter

HO Wai-keung : My expectation for her is

first and foremost, to be happy

Whatever I can provide

I will as much as I possibly can

but you have to walk your own path in life

Setting an example is often required

Let's say

if you saw an elderly person who needs to open a door on the street

what would you do?

There was one time when, for certain reasons I wasn't sure

except that maybe she'd heard plenty from me

she rushed off all of a sudden

It turned out that she saw an elderly person struggling to open a door

so she helped open it

It was a very moving moment for me

seeing that she'd imbibed the values I taught her
