# Unforgettable mission experience

Jennifer TONG	:	My first mission was the most unforgettable one
		When I was in Afghanistan in 2015
		a child stepped on a landmine
		and his legs had to be amputated
		The blood bank in Afghanistan was nothing like what we have in Hong Kong
		sophisticated and with sufficient blood supply
		On that occasion, we had to perform a blood transfusion
		and had the whole village come in for cross-matching
		to find the suitable blood donor for the child
		so that we could complete the surgery with success
		When a villager got hurt
		the entire village would work together to help

### Maintaining a long-distance family relationship

Jennifer	:	I'm a surgeon for the MSF
TONG		Generally speaking, a mission lasts anywhere from 4 weeks and up
		I personally choose missions that could last longer
		from around 8 weeks to 3 months
		For me, it takes time to get to know a new place
		If I leave too soon

I'll find it less than ideal During those 3 months communication with my family relied on the internet If the internet connection wasn't all that good voice calls would have to do I remember that on my first visit to Afghanistan in 2015 I stayed there for 8 weeks Not one night had Mum gone to bed without waiting for my call which she would receive in the morning and she dared not sleep until then When I got back, I noticed she had lost a lot of weight As I went on increasingly more missions Mum realised and understood that I was shrewd so her worries dwindled Also I try to squeeze in a holiday for a week or two between projects and meet my family at a midpoint to go on a trip together Say, in 2018, I completed my mission in Haiti Since Haiti was a country in Central America I flew to the USA to meet up with my family and went on a brief family trip with them Then I headed off to Brussels and Iraq to take up my next mission

### Family support is the key to chasing dreams

Jennifer : My family has given me a lot of support TONG First and foremost is financial support When I was a full-time MSF doctor I didn't have to help finance family expenses Mum even gave me a living allowance Therefore, without any financial burden at that time I did the work I loved Then there's moral support My family saw me leave Hong Kong for project after project but they didn't press me to say when I'll be willing to settle down and be a bird on its legs Also, on a few occasions when the mission was coming to an end Mum encouraged me to carry on This was the kind of immense moral and financial support from my family that allowed me to carry on with my missions

### Serving Hong Kong on the anti-epidemic frontline

Jennifer : In 2003 TONG I was still a medical student during the SARS pandemic and not a fully-fledged practising doctor By 2020 I already made it I believed I should do my part and give back to society I regarded Hong Kong as a small mission site for serving Hong Kong patients But my family was rather worried and wondered if I would be stricken by the pandemic as a result of going to the frontline Everything turned out fine and I've never been infected So this time when the 5<sup>th</sup> wave hit in 2022 I volunteered to go to Penny's Bay to serve the infected for 3 months This time around since my parents knew that I gained the experience previously they were quite at ease with me staying on the frontline

#### Spending time with family becomes paramount after witnessing life and death

Jennifer TONG	:	Fact is, having been with the MSF for 2 years
		I witnessed a lot of life and death
		There were families separated by war
		and even living in two different countries for long periods of time
		When I was away from Hong Kong for over 2 years
		to be a full-time MSF doctor
		I felt I owed my family quite a bit

because I didn't spend much time with them Upon returning to Hong Kong I noticed they had aged somewhat so I save more time for them In the past, I hoped to move out and live by myself But now I think sticking with my family is the most important That's why I continue to stay here and live with my family
